The Nebraska Brass has reached audiences in communities throughout the state since 1987, presenting a five-concert series each season in multiple cities. The ensemble performs a variety of literature and commissions new works for brass quintet, preserving and promoting this valuable art form.

Educating students is also a priority for the Nebraska Brass, and through the educational outreach program, Brass Goes to School, the ensemble has reached thousands of students in the past 15 years. This program places the Nebraska Brass in Lincoln and Omaha area schools, where they perform exciting and age-appropriate music, provide informative commentary about the music, and field a variety of questions.

The Nebraska Brass is comprised of musicians with a wealth of experience in both classical and commercial idioms. Members have performed with ensembles such as the Omaha Symphony Orchestra, Lincoln's Symphony Orchestra, Nebraska Jazz Orchestra, Dallas Symphony, Chicago Symphony Orchestra, and Mannheim Steamroller. Members have also toured and performed throughout the United States, Europe, South America, Japan, Australia and the Caribbean with numerous musical ensembles. In addition to their busy performing schedules, members of the Nebraska Brass are experienced as educators who are presently teaching in Nebraska and Iowa public schools and at Nebraska Wesleyan University and University of Nebraska, Lincoln.

The Cathedral Brass Quintet was founded in 2003 by professors at Hastings College, and has since established itself to be one of the premiere performing chamber ensembles in Nebraska.

Currently comprising college professors and music educators, the CBQ can be found in concert, churches, and special events throughout Nebraska. The CBQ has been a featured ensemble with the Hastings Symphony Orchestra (in which all the members are principal players), and as ensemble-in-residence at Hastings College's OpenSpace Immersion for the Performing Arts in June.

A Touch of Brass is a professional brass quintet that has been operating out of Northeast Nebraska since the 1980s. We present a regional concert series each spring, and are available for wedding, funeral, church, or party entertainment services.

The University of Nebraska Faculty Brass Trio is comprised of the faculty from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln. The trio is dedicated to the performance of original repertoire and the underutilized literature written for horn, trombone, and tuba. The members of this group have also commissioned and premiered works for full brass quintet in recent years, including *Copernicus* by Czech composer Juraj Filas, *What We Do is Secret* by Lansing McKloskey, and *Nebrasska* by world-renowned Hollywood composer Bruce Broughton.

Members of this trio have performed and given clinics across the United States and throughout the world, with major performances at the International Horn Society symposium, the International Tuba Association, the International Brass Chamber Music Festival, and on countless concert series across the country. Members of the Faculty Brass Trio are Alan Mattingly, horn, Scott Anderson, trombone, and Bo Atlas, tuba.

## MICHAEL KOCH, DIRECTOR FRIDAY, 10:30AM THE GRADUATE ARDIS BALLROOM

**Michael A. Koch** is currently in his thirty-forth year in the classroom and his twenty-forth year as Director of Bands at Bluffs Middle School in Scottsbluff, NE. He directs the 5th Grade Beginning Band program, the 6th, 7th, and 8th Grade Concert Bands, the Middle School Jazz Band, the Middle School Marching Band and assists with the High School Marching and Concert Bands. Prior to coming to Scottsbluff, Mr. Koch taught in Bridgeport, Shickley, and Milford, all in Nebraska.

Mr. Koch received a Bachelor of Music degree from Hastings College (1988) and a Master of Music Education degree from the University of Nebraska Lincoln (1998). He received the Jack R. Snider Young Band Director Award (1994), was recognized by the Scottsbluff Jaycees as Outstanding Teacher (2003), received a Citation of Excellence from the National Band Association (2003, 2017, 2019), received a Career Teacher Award for 25 years of dedicated service to music education in Nebraska from NMEA. (2012), was selected Music Educator of the Year by the Nebraska Music Educators Association (2013), and received a Career Teacher Award for 30 years of dedicated service to music education in Nebraska from NMEA (2017).



Bluffs Middle School 8th Grade Bands, under the direction of Mr. Koch, have been selected to perform as guest band for the Nebraska State Bandmasters Association Convention (2000, 2016), as guest band for the Nebraska Music Educators Association Convention (2002, 2018), were asked to perform as a "demonstration band" for the Nebraska Music Educators Association Convention (2005 & 2013), and have consistently received Superior Ratings and Best Overall Jr. High/Middle School Band Awards at the "Music In The Parks" Festivals of Music in Denver, Colorado. Members of the 7th & 8th Grade Bands have performed in concert with the "Dallas Brass" (2009) and the "Presidio Brass" (2012), and the 7th & 8th Grade Brass Ensemble was selected to perform at "Music Education Week at the Capitol" (2012).

Mr. Koch is a past Board Member of the Nebraska Music Educators Association (Middle-Level Affairs - 2007 & 2008), he is a staff member for the Nebraska Ambassadors of Music (2003 to 2019 - traveling to Europe nine times), and a member of Phi Beta Mu International School Bandmaster Fraternity. He is also a member of the Nebraska Music Educators Association, National Association for Music Education, Nebraska State Bandmasters Association, Nebraska State Education Association, and the Scottsbluff Education Association.

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# MATT ROM, DIRECTOR FRIDAY, 12:45PM THE GRADUATE ARDIS BALLROOM

In only its second year of existence, the Elkhorn North High School band program is modest but growing in numbers and aspiration. In addition to the grades nine through 12 concert band you see today, Elkhorn North hosts a competitive marching band that achieved a top 10 finish and its first year of competition, two pep bands, multiple auditioned and non auditioned jazz ensembles, an indoor drumline, a winterguard, show band, musical pit orchestra, and various student led small ensembles that occur throughout the year. The students and families of the Elkhorn North band program are proud to contribute to the musical opportunities in the Omaha area for neighboring schools, regularly hosting HWAA events, as well as teaming up with Elkhorn High School and Elkhorn South to host a marching band competition called the Sounds of Excellence.

Matthew Rom grew up in the small town of Aitkin, Minnesota where he was an active member and section leader in school band and choir as well as various community and church ensembles. He attended Concordia College in Moorhead, Minnesota, where he was percussion section leader in the Concert Band and principal timpanist for the Concordia Orchestra which toured extensively, including three performances at the Lincoln Center in New York City premiering Rene Clausen's "Memorial" for the American Choral Directors Association national convention. While at Concordia, Matt studied percussion with Dr. David Eyler, and received his BA in Music Education.

In 2005, Matt moved to Omaha and served for five years as the assistant Band and Choir director at Papillion La Vista South High School, leading students in Marching Band, Concert Band, and Concert Choir settings. He was also responsible for expanding the



scope of the music department, including the addition of music theory and music consumer classes to the standard offerings. In May of 2009, Matt was awarded his Masters degree in conducting at UNO where he studied under Dr. James Saker and Dr. Matthew Harden and conducted the Symphonic Wind Ensemble and Chamber Singers during several concerts. In 2018 he completed another masters degree in Music Education at the University of Nebraska Lincoln.

Matt is currently excited to be in his second year as director of Bands at Elkhorn North High School, opening the building after ten years at Elkhorn High School. In addition to his work at Elkhorn, he is the chair of band affairs for the Nebraska Music Educators Association. Matt is married to Brittany Rom, who currently teaches high school and elementary orchestra for the Millard Public Schools.

The Omaha Central Jazz Ensemble (OCJE) is one of the premier music groups at Omaha Central. The ensemble is a co-curricular class that rehearses during the school day from August to May. This is a non-auditioned group of students from 9<sup>th</sup> through 12<sup>th</sup> grades. The group consists of 22 students this year. Members of the jazz ensemble may audition for Jazz Combos to further develop improvisational skills. Students must participate in band or orchestra to be involved in the jazz ensemble and many students switch to a secondary instrument in order to participate. Some members of our jazz ensemble participate in Metropolitan Area Youth Jazz Orchestra and Blues Society of Omaha. In 2021 we had two participating students and two alternates in the Nebraska All-State Jazz Band.

The OCJE performs numerous times throughout the year. In addition to three home concerts, OCJE makes regular appearances at area contests such as NSBA Jazz Festival, UNO Jazz Festival, Chieftains Jazz Festival,

Midland Festival of Arts, and Northeast Jazz Festival. OCJE is the popular closer at the Central High School Road Show every spring, which has been in place for over 100 years. The group has traditionally served the community of Omaha by performing in special events such as the Outland Trophy ceremony.

The core educational philosophy of the Omaha Central Jazz program is to provide all students with the skills and knowledge to perform jazz music at the highest quality for their age group. We create a robust jazz community by bringing students to concerts, inviting guest clinicians, and encouraging students to participate in jazz ensembles outside of school. We strongly believe in jazz education for all. Every student should have equal opportunity for self-expression through the treasured American art form of jazz.

**Beth Myers** is from Underwood, lowa and has been the Assistant Band Director at Central since 2019. She served as the Collegiate Members chair for the Nebraska Music Education Association board from 2015-2017. Myers was a finalist for the 2019 Music Educator of the Year from Schmitt Music. Before coming to Central, Beth taught 6-8 band and general music at McMillan Magnet Middle School.

She earned a Bachelor of Music in Music Education from the University of Nebraska at Omaha in 2018. While in school at UNO, Beth played alto and baritone saxophone with the Symphonic Wind Ensemble, Jazz I Ensemble, Madsen Jazz Combo, Brass Band, Maverick Marching Band, and Pep Band. Her favorite memories are from traveling with the Jazz Ensemble to Japan, China, Lithuania, and Latvia.

Myers has a passion for instrumental conducting and spends her summers traveling to clinics. Her favorite clinics have been the Shenendoah Conducting Symposium with Mallory Thompson and the Los Angeles Conducting Institute at Caltech with H. Robert Reynolds, Glenn Price, Frank Ticheli, and Wayne Bergeron. She resides in Plattsmouth, Nebraska with her husband Dominick, daughter Claire, and pets Joker, Quinn, and Clark.



Chiyo Trauernicht, a native of Chiba, Japan, is the Band Director at CHS since 2021. Prior to her appointment at CHS, she was the band director at Otte-Blair Middle School from 2007 to 2021. She has received the NSBA Jack R. Snider Young Band Director Award in 2012 and the NMEA Bryan R. Johnson Distinguished Service Award in 2017. She has served as middle level chairs for Nebraska Bandmasters Association and Nebraska Music Education Association, and most recently the president of NSBA. Trauernicht was selected to represent Nebraska in 20th annual "50 Directors Who Make a Difference" issue of School Band and Orchestra Magazine in 2017.

She earned a Bachelor of Arts degree in English and a Master of Arts degree in History from Tokyo University of Foreign Studies. She has completed the music teaching certification program at the University of Nebraska at Kearney. Trauernicht earned a Master of Music degree in Instrumental Conducting from the American Band College of Sam Houston State University.

Chiyo is actively involved in music. She has performed flute and piccolo in numerous organizations such as the Omaha Symphony, Omaha Conservatory of Music, Omaha Symphonic Winds, Orchestra Omaha, Blair Area Community Band, and Nebraska Wind Symphony. She resides in Bennington, Nebraska with her husband Brian, their two-year-old son Connor, and their singing dogs Charlie and Callie.

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#### THE PARAGON RAGTIME ORCHESTRA



This concert is sponsored by generous support from the Nebraska Arts Council, the Pearle Francis Finigan Foundation, and the Rococo Theatre.

The Paragon Ragtime Orchestra is the world's only year-round, professional ensemble re-creating "America's Original Music" – the syncopated sounds of early musical theater, silent cinema, and vintage dance. The PRO came into being as the result of Rick Benjamin's 1985 discovery of thousands of turn-of-the-century orchestra scores once belonging to Victrola recording star Arthur Pryor. In 1988 the Orchestra made its formal debut at Alice Tully Hall – the first concert ever presented at Lincoln Center by such an ensemble. Since then PRO has appeared at hundreds of leading arts venues, including the Ravinia Festival, the Smithsonian Institution, Chautauqua, the Brucknerhaus (Austria), the New York 92nd Street Y, and the American Dance Festival. In 1999 PRO's music inspired master choreographer Paul Taylor's new dance *Oh You Kid!* which was premiered at The Kennedy Center jointly by the Paul Taylor Dance Company and the Orchestra. In June, 2003 the PRO presented the premier of Rick Benjamin's new reconstruction of Scott Joplin's opera *Treemonisha* at San Francisco's Stern Grove Festival. In 2005 and again in 2006, Paragon had the honor of being presented in Minneapolis's Orchestra Hall as guests of the Minnesota Orchestra.

In addition to its worldwide concert hall, university, and festival appearances, the PRO has acquired a considerable following both here and abroad through its radio programs on the *New York Times'* WQXR, National Public Radio (*All Things Considered, Performance Today* and others), the British Broadcasting Corporation, and the *Voice of America* networks. Since 1989 the **Walt Disney Company** has relied on the Orchestra's recordings for the outdoor "area music" heard at *Main Street, U.S.A.* at Disneyland, Disney World, and Disneyland Paris; the PRO strengthened its international following during its extended engagement as a U.S. Ambassador of Goodwill at the 1992 **World's Universal Exposition** in Seville, Spain.

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# RICK BENJAMIN, DIRECTOR FRIDAY, 8:00PM THE ROCOCO THEATRE 140 N 13th STREET

Over the years the Paragon Ragtime Orchestra has been heard on the soundtracks of several motion pictures and television programs. The Orchestra's audio and video recordings have been widely praised, and considered instrumental in rekindling interest in America's rich traditions of theater, cinema, and dance orchestra music.

The Paragon Ragtime Orchestra is an IRS 501(c)(3) Tax Exempt Non-Profit organization. Paragon Ragtime Orchestra concerts are sponsored in part by the National Endowment for the Arts (NEA).









Conductor **Rick Benjamin** has built a career on the discovery and performance of lost American music from the late 19th and early 20th Centuries. He is the founder and director of the Paragon Ragtime Orchestra, which uses his extraordinary 20,000-title collection of historic American orchestral scores (c.1850-1930) as the basis of its repertoire. In addition to his work with Paragon, Mr. Benjamin maintains active careers as a pianist, arranger, and tubist. As a guest conductor leads other innovative ensembles, including the National Orchestra of Ireland (Dublin), the New Jersey Symphony Orchestra, the Aarhus and Aalborg Symfoniorkesters (both Denmark), the Virginia Symphony, the Olympia Symphony (Washington State), the Erie Philharmonic, the Iceland Symphony Orchestra (Reykjavík), and Chamber Music Hawaii.

Mr. Benjamin is also the leading conductor of music for silent films, with over 700 screenings to his credit. His research in early movie music is extensive and

ongoing, and has led to Mr. Benjamin's creation of one of the world's best archives of silent film scores – nearly 1,000 titles ranging from 1898 to 1928. His articles on American music appear in several international publications, and lecture tours have taken him to more than 100 colleges and universities across North America. Mr. Benjamin's reconstruction of the Scott Joplin opera *Treemonisha* was premiered to great acclaim in San Francisco, tours, and was recently recorded by Mr. Benjamin and the PRO in a 2-CD album set for New World Records. Rick Benjamin is continuing work on his books *The American Theater Orchestra* and *Encyclopedia of Arrangers & Orchestrators: 1875-1925.* He is a voting member of the National Academy of Recording Arts and Sciences (www.grammy.org) and a member of Broadcast Music Inc. (www.BMI.com).

## MICHAEL MAPP, DIRECTOR SATURDAY, 11:30AM THE GRADUATE ARDIS BALLROOM

**Dr. Michael W. Mapp** is the Director of Bands and coordinator of the Graduate Instrumental Conducting program at New Mexico State University. Dr. Mapp joined the music faculty at NMSU in 2017. Prior to working at NMSU, Dr. Mapp taught at Washburn University in Topeka, Kansas as Director of Bands and served as associate conductor of the Kansas City Civic Orchestra. He also enjoyed a successful tenure as a public-school teacher. At NMSU, Dr. Mapp's responsibilities include serving as the conductor of the Wind Symphony, administering the graduate program in wind conducting, teaching courses in conducting and literature, and overseeing all facets of the university band program.

Dr. Mapp enjoys an active schedule as a guest conductor, clinician, adjudicator, and producer throughout the United States. Bands under his direction have performed at numerous state, regional, and national conferences, including the Kansas Music Educators Association state convention and the College Band Directors



National Association convention. He has been an invited presenter at multiple state conventions and for CBDNA at the regional and national conventions. He has served as the College Faculty Representative for the Kansas Bandmasters Association and the Kansas State Chair for the National Band Association. He is currently on the Board for the New Mexico Music Educators Association and is the New Mexico representative for the Southwest Region of CBDNA.

As an advocate of new music, Dr. Mapp annually commissions and premiers new works for wind ensemble. Recent commissions and consortiums include works by Kevin Walczyk, Daniel McIntosh, Joni Greene, Chin Ting Chan, Kevin McKee, Bob Leathermon, Lester Pack, Viet Cuong, and Joel Puckett.

Michael holds degrees from New Mexico State University, Wichita State University, and The University of Kansas. He is a member of the New Mexico Music Educators Association, Texas Music Educators Association, the National Association for Music Education, College Band Directors National Association, World Association of Symphonic Bands and Ensembles, and Phi Beta Mu International Band Masters Fraternity. He enjoys life in Las Cruces, New Mexico with his wife Dr. Hyerim Mapp and their dachshund, Karma.

## DOUG BEACH, JAZZ BAND TYLER S. GRANT, CONCERT BAND



**Doug Beach** is a performer, composer, publisher, educator, arranger and Grammy Award winner. At Elmhurst College, where he taught 1978-2021, Beach served as Director of the acclaimed Elmhurst College Jazz Band and Director of Jazz Studies. Under his direction, the jazz band made over 30 European tours (twice at the invitation of the U.S. Department of State) and performed in jazz festivals across the world. The band regularly appeared with jazz greats such as Gary Smulyan, Dennis Mackrel, Nicholas Payton, Dee Dee Bridgewater, Patti Austin, Lee Konitz, Jeff Hamilton and Bobby Shew. The band and its members are frequent award winners in *DownBeat* magazine's Student Music Awards, and in 2014, the Elmhurst College Jazz Band won the *DownBeat* large jazz ensemble category for undergraduate institutions.

Beach is equally well known for his work as a publisher and composer. His company, Doug Beach Music, is one of the world's leading publishers of educational jazz music. He has been the recipient of a Plus Award from the American Society of Composers, Authors and Publishers (ASCAP) nearly every year since 1995. In 1996, The Count Basie Orchestra and New York Voices recorded Beach's arrangement of "Cottontail" on a CD that went on to win a Grammy Award for Best Large Jazz Ensemble Album. His other awards include a 2003 President's Award for Excellence in Teaching from Elmhurst College (the college's highest teaching award), the 2012 Elmhurst College Faculty Merit Award and a 2015 Jazz Education Achievement Award from *DownBeat*.

Beach is also a highly sought-after clinician and adjudicator. He has served as a conductor, guest artist and judge throughout the United States and in Canada, Australia and Europe. He has conducted numerous All-State jazz ensembles and twice has served as an artist-in-residence for the Illinois Arts Council.

A Yamaha Performing Artist, Beach plays Yamaha trumpets and flugelhorns.

Tyler S. Grant is an Atlanta-based composer of music for concert bands, marching bands and chamber groups; many of which have been performed around the world and by musicians of all levels. His works for wind band have been found on Editor's Choice lists from various international music distributors in addition to being performed by many region and state-wide honor bands. His work Panoramic Fanfare was named a winner in the 2014 "Call for Fanfares" Competition hosted by the Dallas Wind Symphony. The fanfare has since been performed by collegiate and professional ensembles in the United States, Canada, and United Kingdom. Since 2010, he has regularly accepted commissions for new works and produced new publications for bands and chamber groups each year. While he has never formally studied composition, he credits his mentors Brian Balmages and Randall Coleman as being pivotal to his success as a composer and a conductor. Notable performance venues of his work include The Midwest Clinic, Carnegie Hall, Meyerson Symphony Center (Dallas), The Macy's Thanksgiving Day Parade, and numerous state-wide, national, and international music conventions.



In addition to his writing, Tyler enjoys conducting and clinic engagements with ensembles throughout the United States. He has served as a conductor and clinician of university, district, and state level honor bands in Alabama, Georgia, North Carolina, Pennsylvania, Maryland, Louisiana, South Dakota, and West Virginia. Tyler was recently a contributing author in Alfred Music Publishing Company's Sound Innovations: Ensemble Development series and has contributed interviews to numerous podcasts and articles including School Band & Orchestra Magazine and The Instrumentalist.

Tyler is a graduate of the University of Alabama where he earned a degree in instrumental music education. He is on the middle and high school music faculty of Holy Innocents' Episcopal School in Atlanta, Georgia and maintains an active composing and conducting schedule. His more than 25 published works are available through The FJH Music Company, Inc. and Tyler S. Grant Music Works, LLC.

# KEYNOTE: TEACHING ON-AND-OFF THE PODIUM: THE IMPORTANCE OF ROLE MODELING DR. TIM LAUTZENHEISER | 6:30PM | THE GRADUATE ARDIS

The artistry of great teaching is never-ending. Being able to focus the collective energy of any group is the cornerstone to musical EXCELLENCE. From the moment the students walk into the class until the final bell rings, there must be a sense of purpose. If you are a good teacher, the students will admire and respect you. If you are a GREAT TEACHER, the students will admire and respect themselves.



**Tim Lautzenheiser** began his teaching career at Northern Michigan University. He then moved to the University of Missouri, and from there to New Mexico State University. During that time, Tim developed highly acclaimed groups in both instrumental and vocal music.

Following his tenure in the college band directing world, he spent three years with McCormick's Enterprises working as Executive Director of Bands of America. In 1981, Tim created Attitude Concepts for Today, Inc., an organization designed to manage the many requests for teacher inservice workshops, student leadership seminars, and convention speaking engagements focusing on the area of effective leadership training. After thirty-plus years of clinic presentations, some three million

students have experienced one of his popular sessions.

Tim presently serves as Vice President of Education for Conn-Selmer, Inc. He is a nationally recognized voice touting the importance of arts education for every child.

His books, produced by G.I.A. Publications, Inc., continue to be bestsellers in the educational community. He is also co-author of popular band method, Essential Elements, as well as the Senior Educational Consultant for Hal Leonard, Inc. Tim is also the Senior Educational Advisor for Music for All, and NAMM (The National Association of Music Merchants).

He holds degrees from Ball State University and the University of Alabama; in 1995 he was awarded an Honorary Doctorate from the VanderCook College of Music. He continues to teach as an adjunct faculty member at: Ball State University, Indiana-Purdue/Ft. Wayne University, and Butler University. In addition, he is a member of the Midwest Clinic Board of Directors and the Western International Band Clinic/American Band College Board of Directors. He is presently the Chair of the National Association for Music Education Music Honor Society (Tri-M).

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# LIVING MUSIC: THE COMPOSER/CONDUCTOR RELATIONSHIP MICHAEL MAPP & JONI GREENE | 8:00AM | EMBASSY SUITES C

Composer Joni Greene and Dr. Michael Mapp, Director of Bands at New Mexico State University discuss the relationship possible between composers and conductors and the many opportunities that arise from collaboration between the two musical forces. Joni Greene's music is described as "rich, colorful, and expressive." Her music has been performed throughout the United States and in Canada, France, Germany, Spain, China and Australia. Her diverse catalog includes works for band, choir, orchestra, chamber ensemble, and chamber opera. Notable awarded prizes include the 2nd and 3rd Frank Ticheli competition, ASCAP/Lotte Lehman "Damien Top" Prize, and the ACC Band Directors Association Emerging Artist Grant. Her work, The Moon Glistens, was released on the 2017 Kansas University Wind Ensemble album by Klavier Music Productions.

Ms. Greene is often commissioned by universities, school districts and chamber ensembles. Upcoming commissions include an opera for band inspired by her ancestors from the 1940s White Rose movement, a new work for concert band for the Nebraska State Bandmasters Association, and a work for soprano voice and wind ensemble for the University of Kansas. Ms. Greene's music is frequently performed and has been featured at festivals and conferences including CBDNA, the International Tuba Euphonium Conference, the World Association for Symphonic Bands and Ensembles conference in Taiwan, the Las Americas en Concierto/ Composers in New York, the Albert Roussel International Festival in France, Essentially Choral Reading Sessions, and the North American Saxophone Alliance (NASA) Conference.

Analyses of Ms. Greene's music for wind band may be found in the School Band and Orchestra (SBO) magazine and Manhattan Beach Times issues 5-7. Additionally, conductor Chad Simons recently published a dissertation on the topic of Ms. Greene's life and music.

Ms. Greene holds MM and BM degrees from Indiana University. Her training also includes instruction abroad and at master-classes across the country. Principle instructors include: Michael Gandolfi, Sven-David Sandstrom, Kevin Puts, Don Freund, David Dzubay, Claude Baker, and Rafael Hernandez.

When she is not composing, Ms. Greene enjoys working in residence with all levels of concert band, orchestra, choir and chamber groups. She currently resides in Austin, Texas with her husband and two sons.

Flutist and piccoloist Leslie Cullen has performed at The Kennedy Center, Ravinia, The Kimmel Center, Lincoln Center, Carnegie Recital Hall, and the Aspen Music Festival, and enjoys a varied career of solo, chamber music, and orchestral playing. She is the Executive Director of the Paragon Ragtime Orchestra and with that group regularly tours nationally and internationally. Paragon also has an extensive discography with New World Records; twice these recordings have been cited for a Grammy for Classical Producer of the Year. Leslie is a native of Oklahoma and has served as an Artist-In-Residence for the Oklahoma State Arts Council. She holds degrees in flute performance from the Manhattan School of Music and The Juilliard School, and as professor of flute at both Susquehanna and



Bucknell Universities she greatly values the opportunity to teach and learn from her students.

Mr. Schweitzer grew up in the home of band director Royce Schweitzer and as his son he brings a unique look at mental health and the impact on the individual and their family, as this career is lived largely in the public eye.

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# DIVERSIFYING OUR REPERTOIRE: WHY AND HOW JANET SONG KIM | 9:30AM | EMBASSY SUITES C

This session uses the ten basic principles of effective teachers to take an in-depth look at effective teaching, professional development, and personal growth within the arts. It also touches upon the opportunities for professional development within the performing arts as well as addresses personal growth and passion as performers.

You've heard it before: DEI initiatives are "in" — but is a "trend" the only reason we should be changing how we program music? This presentation will provide a look into the perspective of a BIPOC director's lived experiences and discuss the nuances involved in programing works by specific composers. It will also provide different answers to the question above, ways in which you can get involved in this initiative, and various resources for works by diverse composers.

Janet Song Kim (she/they) is the new Director of Instrumental Activities and Assistant Professor of Music at Nebraska Wesleyan University. They also just finished her final year as a doctoral assistant in wind band conducting at The UCLA Herb Alpert School of Music, where Kim studied

with Dr. Travis J. Cross. Previously, they earned a Master of Arts degree in instrumental conducting from Indiana University of Pennsylvania and their Bachelor of Music degree in music education and jazz studies magna cum laude from Montclair State University. During their time at Montclair State University, Kim also had the opportunity to study composition with Alan Ferber and learned orchestration from Patrick Burns.

Their primary conducting teachers include Dr. Travis J. Cross, Dr. Timothy A. Paul, Dr. Jason Worzbyt, and Dr. Shelley Axelson.

Kim's performance career began during their time at Montclair, and has performed as a bassoonist, saxophonist, flautist, and clarinetist in various settings. They have performed as a principal bassoonist for the Ridgewood Concert Band, the MSU's Wind Ensemble & Symphony Orchestra, IUP's Wind Ensemble & Symphony Orchestra, and BLYSO. They have also performed as a chamber musician with Lyrica Chamber Music, Lignum Winds, and has also been a scholarship recipient for the Imani Winds Chamber Music Festival. In addition to performing on separate instruments as a bassoonist and saxophonist, Kim has performed as a doubler for several musical theatre shows. Kim began their career as a band director and conductor at Northern Valley Demarest High School and went on to be a band director at several other schools in the state of New Jersey. They led ensembles to perform at Region Band Festivals, District Band Festivals, and has successfully brought home gold and silver ratings during her time as a public-school educator. Most recently, Kim served as the associate director of the Peninsula Symphonic Winds for 2 years while attending and being a Teaching Assistant at UCLA. As they finished their coursework, Kim was hired by UCLA to teach Audio Technology 101 because of their interests in Audio Technology, including but not limited to: DAWs, Synthesizers, Recording Techniques/Equipment, Microphone Technology, and other Sound Equipment.



There she teaches K-6 general music, beginning 5<sup>th</sup> and 6<sup>th</sup> grade band, junior high band, junior high choir, 9-12 band, and 9-12 choir. She continues to carry a tradition of excellence within her school and community with numerous superior ratings among her marching and concert bands. Sake has both her bachelor's and master's degrees as a proud Wayne State College alumnus. 
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#### JACK R. SNIDER YOUNG BAND DIRECTOR AWARD
